Administrative Updates

- A. Dr. Margaret Venable, Interim President: Welcome back. Our enrollment levels have exceeded 5,000 students.
- B. Dr. Jodi Johnson, Vice-President for Enrollment and Student Affairs: Welcome back. Dalton State College has experienced a rise in enrollment. A campus-wide celebration will be held in honor of this milestone at the Bell Tower. Progress is being made at the Wood Valley construction site and the foundation of the new residential building has been poured. The renovation of the Pope Student Center is officially approved. A focus group was held, at which student leaders and faculty met with architects. Construction starts December 15. Plans for a new Health Center are being made. Plans are being made to turn the old handball court into another playing field.
- C. Dr. Andy Meyer, Interim Vice-President for Academic Affairs: A BBA in Finance and Applied Economics is confirmed. A Bachelor of Arts in Communications and a Bachelor for Chemistry Technicians will come in the future.
- D. Mr. Scott Bailey, Vice-President for Fiscal Affairs: Within 30 days, the Technical building will be completed and in full working order.

Old Business

- A. Recap of Budget Allocation for FY16: \$800 has been set aside to allocate to new RSOs (\$150-\$200 upon founding). \$7050 has been set aside to fill requests for funding. Academic Affairs was given \$20,000 by the Foundation. The 2015-2016 Budget can be found on the Dalton State College website.
- B. SGA Funding Policy: There has been a change in the Funding Guidelines: RSOs must attend 6 SGA meetings to be eligible for funding. Individual students can submit a funding request for an amount up to \$500, and up to \$1000 for a conference at which the individual's presence is requested. RSOs and individuals who are given funding MUST comply with the Funding Policies. The 2015-2016 Funding Policy can be found on the Dalton State College website.

New Business

A. Senator, School of Health Professions: Seth Owen has resigned from his position as Senator of the School of Health Professions.

Carolina Gomez has accepted her appointment by the Dean of the School of Health Professions as the new Senator of Health Professions.

- B. USG Day at the Capitol January 25, 2016: On Monday, January the 25th, USG Day at the Capitol will happen in Atlanta, Georgia. A school van will be taken. SGA representatives are highly encouraged to attend.
- C. SGA Spirit Days, Katherine Fromm: The last Thursday of every month will now be SGA Spirit Days, or Roadrunner Pride Days. Students and faculty are asked to show school spirit in a visible and more tangible way to show their support for Roadrunner Nation. Programming will follow.
- D. Committee Appointments: SGA standing committees are now accepting appointments and volunteers. Any SGA student representative may be a member of a standing committee in Student Government Association. The Faculty Resources Committee must be finalized.
- E. Committee Updates. Traffic Appeals, Jonathan Scwhan: In the first week of classes, we have had three traffic appeals. Two were denied and one has been approved.
- F. Student Code of Conduct, Brittnie Lee, Coordinator for Student Responsibility and Service: Changes have been made to the Student Code of Conduct. Many changes are format-related. The Mission Statement of Student Conduct has been added to the Code of Conduct. New and detailed definitions have been added. Several statements of the Code of Conduct have been relocated to more relevant sections. The Abuse of the Student Conduct System has been removed. Student Procedures has been reformatted. An Appeals Process has been added in the form of an Appeals section. Future changes: the addition of an updated Student Code of Conduct will be added to the Dalton State College website.

C. Faculty Senate, Cristopher Wozny

The Faculty Senate meets on the second Wednesday of every month. Communication between Faculty Senate and SGA would be ideal, seeing as how they are both important groups at Dalton State College and function similarly. Sometimes, Faculty Senate and SGA issues overlap. Interest in student input: The possibility of class schedule adjustments are in the works – should an activity hour be added to each class day? Online courses are a challenge for some – should there be a prerequisite for online courses, should there be limits based on year in school for online courses, and should there be methods to judge preparation for online courses? - D. LeaderShape; Savimbi Thomas, Deshawn Ruffin, and Laurely Caycho Savimbi Thomas, Deshawn Ruffin, and Laurely Caycho attended LeaderShape and presented what they learned to SGA.
 - a. Savimbi and Deshawn: Sometimes, athletics seems separate from the rest of the Dalton State community. Bridging the gap between athletics and the rest of the campus is critical. We want students to show more potential and to be multifaceted. Getting students involved in multiple things at their college and community would harbor much growth. Guest speakers and events will be held by Deshawn Ruffin to reach out to students on topics of leadership, involvement, establishing themselves, finding their potential, and impacting others. What we can do as a campus if we come together is endless.
 - b. Laurely: Workshops for students and parents to help fill out and apply for financial aid would be ideal and much appreciated by students. This would give students more initiative to attend college. A goal of mine is to hold Workshop Day twice a week in November. The Latino Outreach Program will help provide bilingual services for this program.

E. New RSO Requests:

a. Hispanic Scholarship Fund Scholar Chapter at Dalton State (HSF), Yasmin Flores HSF's purpose is to reach out to young Latinos in the U.S. and encourage them to attend institutions and to help them plan and pay for college. The Scholar Chapter's purpose is to be a support service for Latino students at Dalton State and in our community, providing network opportunities to all college students and giving information to Latinos in high schools about college and opportunities. We will promote academic success and engage Latino students. Scholarships for undergraduate and graduate students will be offered. We request a budget of \$200.

Yasmin Flores: Dalton High School and Morris Innovative High School, and possibly Eastbrook Middle School.

b. Astronomical Society of Dalton State College, Micah Goulart

Dr. Samantha Kaj Blair is the advisor of this club. Mission: To educate and raise consciousness about the importance of Astronomy and its principles through the advocation of a cosmic perspective. We want students to join so they may learn new things about the complex universe in which we live. This will be open to all students. DSC is in the process of constructing an observatory with a telescope larger than that of the Tellus Museum. Astronomy students will be able to do undergraduate research in the new astronomy lab. All students will be able to use this telescope. All students who join can associate with others with similar interests. Requirements: 2.0 GPA and an interest in astronomy. We have a conceptual look at astronomy, not mathematical. Events: Introductory meeting, explanation of the mechanics of a telescope and how to use them because there will be private and public observation nights, and lectures. A \$300 budget wasrequested, but was changed to \$200 to attend and pay for lectures and presentations.

Motion: Chigozie Obonna moves to approve Astronomical Society as an RSO. *The floor is open for discussion.*

Chigozie Obonna: Are you open to collaborations?

Micah Goulart: Yes, with any STEM and non-STEM organizations.

Collin Burriss: The school offers transportation. How would that money be used? Micah Goulart: The money would be used for guest transportation, not student transportation.

Motion Carried, Approved [92%], Objected [5%], Abstained [3%] Motion: Leslie Elrod moves to award Astronomcial Society \$200 for their budget. Motion Carried, Approved [87%], Objected [8%], Abstained [5%]

c. Mosaic, Ethan Davis

Mosaic is an LGBTQ+ student organization for Dalton State College, welcoming both LGBTQ+ students and allies. This will be a community building opportunity for LGBTQ+ students and allies, a resource to teach people how to handle conflict constructively, and a way to create a safe space for the LGBTQ+ community at DSC. Mosaic will have a president, secretary, treasurer, and committees for things such as events, decorating, and promotion. Our goals are to establish a safe zone at DSC, portray a positive representation of the LGBT community, building said community, and initiating dialogue – community dialogue. We want to have fundraising, dialogue, and community events. An amount of \$200 is requested for a budget to cover recruitment events, October Pride Month events.

Motion: Jonathan Schwan moves to approve Mosaic as an official RSO. *The floor is open for discussion.*

Kat: Dialogue events will be to organize a dialogue between LGBT and allies and the rest of the school. We're here to make a difference at DSC and in the community and to provide support. Community outreach will occur.

Chris Mendoza: If we don't adapt and move forward with the times, we will fall behind.

Jordan Sattler: As a gay Greek life member on campus, I support this. Though many have been accepting of the LGBT community, some are not. A group like this is needed.

Vicky Crane: Is it possible to do education events on appropriate and inappropriate verbage?

Kat: We will do educational dialogue events.

Larry Smith: What role would you play in the community for incoming students in high schools who are LGBTQ+ to make them feel comfortable?

Kat: This is why we want to create a group. There is little to no representation of the LGBTQ+ community on campus. We want a bigger presence on campus to show that gay people are welcome here. Everyone has their own journey, and the LGBTQ programming made me comfortable in my own skin. We want to help others improve.

Will Skiffen: There are many opportunities for this organization to work through. Christopher Mendoza: Most LGBTQ teens have an internal struggle. The issue with the LGBTQ community, unlike race, ethnic, or other communities, is that it is an invisible community. Unless you're told, you won't know if someone identifies as LGBTQ. 1 in 4 teen suicides are due to LGBT issues. 75% of homeless teens are LGBT. Give these teens and young people a beacon of light confirming that they exist and are supported.

Auxiliary Services is a self-supporting part of the campus, upheld by campus fees and income gained in bookstore sales. New "swipe and tap" card technology will soon be implemented in student IDs. Swipe and tap security technology for student and faculty IDs have been installed in some buildings, and more is to come. Existing students will be allowed to switch to the new card technology at no charge. Auxiliary Services will soon have a new log. We have hired a new bookstore manager. A goal of ours is to focus on affordability for students in the bookstore. Students may be using more used textbooks in the future instead of new textbooks (if instructors agree to use same text for several years). Print and copy services will be releasing mobile printing services for tablets, laptops, and cellphones. New charging stations have been installed in the gymnasium, Peeples, and Liberal Arts. Stations are being secured in their new locations due to several being stolen. New microwaves are being put in Peeples, Liberal Arts, and Pope.

Metz Culinary will begin providing modern traditional dining services to Dalton State College in January. There will be little changes in menu items from January until July. New dining stations will provide a larger variety of foods, including gluten-free, vegan, and vegetarian meals. With the change in dining services will come the expansion of our meal plan options. Marketing & Communications will soon be contacting students about the change. Starbucks and Krispy Kreme will soon join Rage Café, as well as the addition of "grab and go" fare. Swipe and tap technology will extend to dining services.

Drew Serrete: Derek Waugh: What is the purpose of the athletic fee? It won't help Residential Life in any way.

Derek Waugh: Winning the NAIA Championship has nothing to do with fee increase. Right now, our athletic fee is at \$83. Competing schools have far higher athletic fees. We are fundraising over twice as much as other schools via private donations. An intangible benefit of this fee raise is raising the profile of the school. All scholarships for athletics are privately fundraised. If enrollment and HSI are raised and we continue to win games, the school as an institution is improved and will experience more positive change and is benefitted politically. This is only a \$15 increase. We want funding that is nearer in number to our competition.

Larry Smith: How would we be impacted if we lost donors?

Derek Waugh: Quality would decline, competitiveness would decline, and sports would be cut. We would then have no choice but to fall back on the student athletics fee. William Melendez: Will SGA take up the responsibility to inform students about the proposed fee increases and what they will go toward? Student leaders should promote more voting to get more accurate results in our referendums.

Drew Serrette: Will the athletics fee go toward better athletic facilities? Derek Waugh: We partner with Bradley Wellness and other facilities to leave the gymnasium free and we have opened the intramural field. Generally, the state builds those facilities. The athletics fee is an investment in better school facilities, better performance, and improved payoff for students and our school.
